Costumes are encouraged—so bring your little goblins, ghosts, and superheroes for some Halloween fun.

Visitors of all ages can enjoy a variety of activities, including:

Admission is \$5, and children under 3 are free. Shelburne Museum members receive free admission and priority entrance to Haunted Happenings.

Please note: After Haunted Happenings events end at 1 p.m., the museum will remain open until 5 p.m., including all buildings and exhibitions. To mark the end of the 2025 public season, admission will remain \$5 per person for the rest of the day.
